Council discussed the Worship Committee's recommendations from the survey findings and will be discussing it further. Council approves of the changes to Advent/Christmas on a trial basis.

Fellowship

Committee discussed having next year's Chili Cook-off in November. They are planning a "Trunk or Treat" for Halloween in our parking lot. They will be passing out flyers at that time for our Chili Cook-off at church for the next week.

Fellowship will serve cake on May 5 after confirmation.

Building/Property

Jim Steinbauer and Virgil will be cleaning out the gutters when the weather is a little better. Kevin will set a clean up day for church sometime during the first part of May.

Discretionary Giving at Peace Lutheran Church

This relatively unknown way of our Christian outreach has been a traditionally-accepted practice for some time now at Peace Lutheran Church and in many other churches across America.

Discretionary giving is shared by our Pastor in providing care for the needy, some of whom might be members of our church and some who are not. Examples of its use might include money given to a hungry family to purchase groceries; money given very well be the to an ailing elderly woman to provide her with transportation to a doctor appointment; money for a new pair of slacks for a homeless person or perhaps only gas money for a woman stranded in the area with no money to fuel her car for a trip back home.

Within our own church, for instance, we provided such help to a member who had trouble paying his utility bills.

Our pastor is allowed to spend no more than \$50 at any one time based on his sole judgement of need and at his complete discretion. This form of sincere,

heartfelt giving is confidential financial support and for people truly in need.

This form of giving may most poignant example of Jesus, teaching where we help the poor and downtrodden

Also the west end of the parking lot will be cleaned up. Council discussed fertilization and weed control for the grounds. The cost is about \$782 for four applications from Lawn Medic in South Bend. Plan is to wait until next year and add into budget.

Pastor's Report

The summary of pastor's activities are as follows: Chili Cook-off, Church Council Retreat, Confirmation Class, Family Fellowship, Home Visits, Hospital Visits, Lenten Soup Suppers, Lutheran Clergy Text Study, Mutual Ministry Committee, Nursing Home Visits, Office Visit, Ordination in Hammond, Ind., Radio Interview, Thursday, Men's Bible Study, Tuesday Prayer Meeting, Tutoring at Upton Middle School, Worship Committee, Worship on four Sundays and four Wednesdays.

NALC convocation is in Indianapolis, Indiana in early August, from Wednesday at noon, until Friday at 5 p.m. Peace can send one delegate and a visitor. This year the new bishop will be elected, so it is very important to send a delegate from Peace.

The tax schedule has changed on figuring mileage. Pastor suggested to receive \$.15 per mile for gas when he rides his scooter, instead of the \$.585 a mile when he drives his car. Virgil made a motion to pay \$.15 per mile for gas when Pastor Hartten rides his scooter, Kevin seconded the motion and the motion was

passed.

New Business

Bev discussed tuition assistance for the North American Lutheran Seminary. Last year we had a special offering plate in May to contribute to the NALS. Kevin made a motion to have a special offering plate for NALS tuition assistance. Ed seconded the motion and the motion passed. It was decided to have the special offering on Confirmation Sunday, May 5.

Discretionary fund

This fund was set up many years ago for the pastor to use at his discretion in case of an emergency need for a congregation member or a member of our community. This is a fund that members donated monies for these special needs. An article will be published either in the newsletter and/or a bulletin to further explain this fund.

Closing notes

Pastor passed out a flyer titled "Make your church both Safe and Welcoming". This is a topic that will be discussed at a later time.

Motion to adjourn. Karen made a motion to adjourn at 7:50 p.m.


Planning is underway for the 2019 Paul Todd Benefit Concert
