It turns out the world isn't an easy place for a cross. That's why I'm proud of the one that stands on our church property in Sylvia's Garden. Our cross—once an instrument of torture—stands proudly in defiance of those who would ridicule the peaceful meekness of the man it failed to kill. Our cross—once an emblem of state power—stands as an almost mocking reminder that the powers of this world will not have the last word.

Our cross—once a shameful implement of cruelty, humiliation and death—is now re-purposed to stand as an emblem of Christian hospitality, love and life.

Our cross—once a tool to be feared—is now a beacon of hope and healing wherever it is found.

Our cross still stands on Lincoln Avenue because God's peace is stronger than war; because God's love is stronger than hatred; because God's grace is stronger than exclusion; because God's hope is stronger than fear; and because God's life is stronger than death.

Our cross stands under the shadow of Peace Lutheran's steeple through wind and rain, hail, snow and sleet; in cold and heat because no matter what the world throws at our cross, God's

I've watched members work to fix it, to keep it upright and strong against the Michigan winds.

I've wondered as the repairs are made, is the cross fixing those who are working to repair it?

Of course, there's only one way the cross fixes us and there's only one way *Christ's* cross becomes *our* cross. We'll have to do what Jesus said, and take it up, and follow Him.

Call to Order President Bev So The meeting was called to order at 11:35 a.m.

Approval of Agenda

Evelyn Chevrette made a motion to approve the agenda and Sandy Warren seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Approval of Minutes of Sept. 22

Jill Chapman made a motion to approve the congregational meeting minutes from Sept. 22. Jeanette Jeske seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Council Report Bev So

Since last meeting in September, there have been many activities happening here at Peace. Our newest very successful activity was the Trunk or Treat on October 26. Other activities include the Chili Cook Off, Harvest Dinner, and Greening of the Church. Hats and mittens were given to children at Lybrook Elementary school in Eau Claire. We hosted lunch at the Soup Kitchen in October and December, and gave Christmas gifts to two families through the Salvation Army. Also a big thank you to Sharon Schmidt and participants in the successful SCRIP program.

Improvements have been seen in the church, such as the updated nursery, new energy-saving lights in the sanctuary and hallways, updated website and the new youth room.

Bev talked to the congregation about how and why a church is formed. Christ looked at the needs of the people, provided it and then began to preach out the good deeds. The church today must live up to its true billing of meeting the needs of the people.

Our congregation has some difficult decisions to make and questions to answer in the near future. Questions such as "Why are we here? What should we do going forward? Are our minds and hearts open to each other?" We pray that Peace may enter a new age of loving and understanding, of outreach into the lives of our members and our community.

Dominic asked about the attendance data which was an average of 97 people in 2013 and about 66 in 2019. Margaret Schmieding made a motion to accept the budget as written. Ginger Kunst seconded the motion and the motion passed.

There are many highlights for our congregation. We were the first church to raise money for the Coast Guard when they were without pay, and other churches followed our lead.
