

# Pastor's Message

This summer, I'm asking everyone to go and visit another church! I'm serious, I'd like you to go and worship with a congregation you've never visited. Do this at least once this summer. I think it is good practice to place oneself in the role of visitor, to be a stranger in a strange land.

When a routine becomes overly familiar, I can lose sight of the familiar. On my commute to work, do I really notice the houses and farms, or do they just blur together?

If I'm going through the supermarket, I look for the items I want in their customary places; it is almost second-nature.

When I know where "my seat" is in the sanctuary, I may not notice the lack of signage in the narthex that could inform a visitor where bathrooms are located and I may not even notice the stranger among us. I can be too settled in my familiar routine.

Go and visit another church, one that you've never been to before. As you pull in the driveway, is it obvious where visitors park? How easy is it to find the main entrance if there are more than one door?

What type of welcome did you receive? Were there official greeters and if so, how did they greet you? Were you provided instructions or did you just get a hello?

How easy is it to follow the liturgy? Was it fully printed in a bulletin or were there hymnals?

Did anyone acknowledge your presence while you were in the Sanctuary? Is fellowship time inviting for visitors or is it a closed group with all the tables occupied?

Did you learn anything from the bulletin boards? What experiences did you have as the outsider?

Make a mental (or if your memory is as good as mine - a written) list of what it was like; what helped you feel welcome and what made it more difficult to connect with the congregation and feel at ease.

Then come back to Peace and look at our practices with new eyes. Where do our visitors park? If you didn't know where the bathrooms were, would you have to ask a member? Is a visitor acknowledged in the Sanctuary or Narthex beyond the official greeter?

We profess to being a warm and welcoming congregation. It is much easier to build upon strength than to try and tackle weaknesses. I am asking us to look at ways we can build upon our strength by learning what it feels like to be the visitor.

Experience worship as an outsider, bring that experience back with you, and let us see how we can improve the Sunday morning experience for our visitors.

## **Closed Doors Mean Prayer is Occurring**

In the March 2017 newsletter, Pastor Steve wrote a column about experimenting with keeping the Sanctuary doors closed until the start of the Prelude on Sunday morning. The closed doors provided for two distinct spaces: one inside the Sanctuary for prayer and quiet reflection, the other out in the Narthex for conversation.

The experiment was a resounding success. What began with a group of about ten people seeking quiet time in the Sanctuary has grown to thirty or more people on a given Sunday. Ushers are positioned outside the doors in the Narthex to welcome worshipers and to interact with those who desire conversation. People who want to talk are free to do so; those who desire quiet time now have a designated space.

Signs have been posted in the windows of the Sanctuary as a reminder of our ongoing practice. Anyone can enter the Sanctuary at any time, the one request is that conversation ceases as the person walks through the doors. In this manner we are honoring the needs of both groups, those who prefer to socialize before worship and those who desire quiet time for reflection before worship. Thank you for your patience and understanding for your fellow worshiper who desires a different practice as he prepares to meet the Lord in His house.


# What Does This Mean to Me?

This regular newsletter feature—playing on Luther's famous line in the Small Catechism—is designed to help us all better understand why things happen as they do at Peace. There has been much confusion the past couple of years as different pastors introduced different worship practices. The worship committee actively seeks feedback or questions from congregation members confused or concerned about worship practices. This portion of the newsletter will share an issue raised at the worship committee and provide an answer for the congregation. Often when one person raises a question, others have similar thoughts but do not want to ask the question.

## "Will Peace Lutheran be holding a Passover Dinner next year?"

This question has arisen several times in my short tenure as pastor. Since Jesus was celebrating the Passover or Pesach during the week when he was arrested, tried, and executed, why shouldn't we experience the meal too? I believe that hosting a Jewish Passover outside the context of Jewish relationships does more harm than good.

Christians celebrating our own Passover do unwitting harm to the Jewish people because the act ignores centuries of persecution of Jews, and it does harm to us by ignoring our present-day Jewish neighbors, treating them as relics rather than people. The horrific fear that so many Jewish people have felt cannot be understated. From Easter traditions that involved hunting down Jews to pogroms to ghettos to the Spanish Inquisition to the



When Christians read the Haggadah (Jewish instructions for hosting a Seder) we are tempted to explain how Jesus is like the Passover lamb, how Jesus fulfilled all the Old Testament prophecies. This theological exercise does not belong in a Jewish ritual. Because Jewish people do not believe the Christian interpretation of their holy texts, it would not be appropriate for a congregation to host a sacred Jewish meal.

If Peace is willing to befriend a Jewish synagogue in the area, if we are willing to learn about each other's faith, and if a Rabbi was willing to come and teach about the Seder, then Peace could observe a type of Seder under the direction of a Rabbi. Another option for those who desire to participate in a Seder would be to gain an invitation from a Jewish family to participate in their celebration.

## **NALC** launches Holy Families initiative

The North American Lutheran Church has launched its Holy Families! initiative. Holy Families! offers discipleship resources for families to use at home. Holy Families! is a part of the NALC's observance of the 500th anniversary of the Reformation — noting the significant contribution of Martin Luther and the Reformation to nurturing faith in the Christian home.

The Thrivent Foundation provided a generous grant to make Holy Families! possible. Produced by Sola Publishing, this special initiative includes a number of Lutheran discipleship resources for families and congregations, including the Holy Families! website The centerpiece of the Holy Families! initiative is the website — www.holyfamilytime.com — featuring a host of resources to aid in promoting discipleship in the home.

Included are online materials, downloadable PDF documents, prayers, educational videos, as well as a daily devotional resource for use by parents and children. Accessible through computer, phone, and tablet, the "Holy Family Time" daily devotional is freely available to the public. The hope is that this website will serve as a gift to enrich the lives of families throughout the world.

The Holy Family Time devotional was written with these key emphases in mind: 1. Solid Biblical Content. 2. Child- and Family-Friendly Readings. 3. Lutheran Theological Perspective. 4. Questions Asked by the Children. 5. Employing Luther's Three-fold Approach to Scripture: Prayer, Study, and Struggle.

### **Christian Parenting Aid**

Video Study for Christian Parents "Living as Holy Families" is an online video study by Pastor Marcus Carlson in the form of six videos and downloadable study and leader's guides.
